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A WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT

Greetings from St. Francis!

It is the beginning of another exciting year for the Flyers, and things are off to a great start. In what has become an annual tradition, we began this year with a Eucharistic Procession, bringing Jesus to reside with us in school in a designated chapel. Our students are increasingly engaging their faith, and our faculty and staff are modeling Catholic Christian behavior by doing everyday things in Christ-centered ways.

We are so blessed at St. Francis with the rich history and tradition of our school. However, there are some challenges beyond our control that will need to be addressed. The rural population in all parts of the country continues to decrease. Teachers, especially after the pandemic, are harder and harder to hire. The availability of priests is also declining. Since none of these trends show any signs of abating, the Archdiocese of Omaha is embarking on a ten-year pastoral plan to address the current realities.

Although this plan is in development, one of the decisions already made is the composition of our new family. In addition to having St. Francis in Humphrey, Holy Family in Lindsay, St. Mary's in Leigh and St. Michael's in Tarnov, Ss. Cyril and Methodius Parish and St. John Neumann grade school in Clarkson will be joining us. We will be

assigned two priests; one pastor and one associate for these fiveparishes, two high schools, three grade schools, and two daycares run by the Church in these communities.

Obviously, this will require some streamlining. What that looks like precisely has yet to be determined. It seems clear, however, that there will be significant changes in the way our parish and schools operate in the very near future.

As alumni, your support through this transition will be vital. Now more than ever, we will need your prayers in the difficult decisions that will need to be made. The only certainty is that our future is always bright because it is always guided by prayer!

May God bless you and your families this fall. I will be keeping you all in my prayers as well.

Through Title IV funds, St. Francis has purchased musical instruments—flute: saxophone: trumpet; clarinet; bass and electric guitars; a drum set; and everyone's favorite, classroom sets of recorders! It is exciting to witness the students'

eagerness to learn and explore these instruments.

Also new this vear, we are incorporating student prayer groups. We are connecting with community members to come into school and lead groups during the school day. It is our hope these opportunities will assist students in building a relationship with Jesus. Religion classes traditionally focus on teaching the faith. Prayer groups focus on the relational piece of the faith.

To celebrate Fr. Olsen's 20th anniversary as a Catholic priest, we gathered in the church for his regular Thursday afternoon offering of benediction with the elementary. Fr. The singing of "Holy God We Praise Thy Name" was glorious.

Catholic tradition is an important part of attending school at St. Francis. 

Mrs. Dunn was nominated for her calm under pressure. "Because of her desire to show the love of Christ, she never hides from difficult situations," said Father Eric Olsen. "Rather, she confronts them directly, professionally, consistently and always with the eye to what is best for the school, the student or employee, and the Church."

LETTER JACKETS ARE BACK!

Flyer pride and accomplishments can now be displayed on letter jackets if students choose to purchase one. The jackets have returned to St. Francis after a more than 20-year absence, and Sarah Kessler (Dustin 1997) took the reins on organizing the design and purchase possibilities.

The letter of St. Francis high school is an emblem sanctioned by the school for achievement as a sign that a student has conformed to school regulations, has observed training rules, has manifested a correct attitude toward teachers and school regulations, and has shown true Catholic sportsmanship.

Recipients of award letters are determined by criteria set in advance of the season by head coaches in addition to the preceding criteria. The criteria for each sport and activity are different. A student is awarded a letter the first time he/she earns one in any sport or fine art activity such as one act and speech. After the first letter, students are given a certificate for each additional letter. A student is to be given a letter his/her vear for four senior vears participation, if they finish in good standing.



The St. Francis letter received a facelift. Historically it was a large "H" with the letters "SF" sewn in the center. The new letter represents St. Francis in a big, bold way.

Participation pins are awarded during the May honors night each year. These pins can be displayed on the letters which can be displayed on the jackets.

Coach Dean Korus, in his 35th year as the Lady Flyers head coach, has six seniors on the roster and is looking forward to big things from his team as they finish the season, hopefully with an appearance at the state tournament. Should be an exciting time for the Lady Flyers.

The St. Francis cross country team is also off to a great start. Coach Denise Brockhaus has five boys out this year, and all of them have improved their times over the course of the season. Senior Garret Zach has broken multiple school records this fall and has been a consistent medalist for the Flyers.

The team also broke a school record at the Kearney all-state meet in September. Big things are in the future of this team as the state meet in Kearney approaches.

The St. Francis football team has an adventurous start to their 2022 campaign. The Flyers started 0-2 with loses to ranked teams EPPJ and Wynot. They responded by winning their next two games,

highlighted by an overtime thriller over 3rd ranked Osceola on the last play of the game. The Flyers are currently in district play with hopes of making their 28th consecutive playoff appearance later in October.

The months of September and October are two of the busiest months for St. Francis athletics not only for our varsity teams but also our jr. high teams. A special thanks to all our jr. high coaches for all the time and effort they put in to coach as we are very lucky to have such quality coaches working with our jr. high athletes.



FINAL FLIGHT

FEATURING ALUMNI JARED & TIFFANI WIEHN

Those who know in high school exactly what they want to do with the rest of their lives are rare. Jared Wiehn (class of 2003) was one of those as he entered the Army National Guard on July 2, 2002—the summer before his senior year and, after many years with the Army, had planned for this to be his life's work. And it has been, up until a few months ago when he received a letter telling him he was being discharged for medical reasons. He served in the army for 20 years as of July 2, and will celebrate his 20th class reunion in May.

Having returned from boot camp and AIT training in October of 2003, it did not take long for Jared to see active duty. In November 2003 he left home for training in Kansas and left the US, deployed to Iraq, in January 2004. During his time in Iraq he provided supplies for those in the field.



When he returned in January of 2005, he first started classes at SCC for heating and electric but was offered a full time job at Camp Ashland, and he took that position. In 2010, he married his high school sweetheart, Tiffani (Foltz, class of 2004.) Then in 2012 Jared was offered a position in Grand Island with the National Guard, which he accepted. Just weeks after the birth of their daughter, Alivia, in July of 2013, Jared left for training to become a helicopter mechanic. He returned home in December of that same year.

Two years later, he was deployed to Kuwait from May 2015 through January 2016, working as a helicopter mechanic. Tiffani had given birth to their second child, Preston, just three weeks before Jared shipped out.

His third deployment, this time to Afghanistan, came just three years later from January of 2019 to November of 2019. He and Tiffani now had three children: Alivia (5), Preston (3), and Devin (3 months). This was a shorter 8-month stay-but it was more intense in regard to his job. He operated as a door gunner/flight engineer and saw action regularly. His team was in charge of air assaults. They hauled teams of specialized soldiers to where they had a mission, dropped them off, and returned to pick them up when they were called. They flew at night to avoid being seen under the call sign KIDNAP, as that was the operation of the special forces, SEALS, and other teams they supported. The missions they flew were secret and the less they knew the better as the teams they transported and picked up were assigned to kidnap enemy commanders and others of political or military clout.

Every time they returned to pick up the team, there were people in custody. Jared did not know who they were, nor did he ask. He simply stuck to his mission, which was getting the team in and out of their operation safely.

It was during a mission in Afghanistan, just before Memorial Day 2019, that he was in a helicopter crash that eventually caused his medical discharge. They were just starting off in their chinook when a vehicle could be seen coming directly at them. The lights on the car went off, and the vehicle disappeared in the dark. The pilots got scared, pulled up, and crashed the helicopter from about 100 ft. in the air. There were 35 people aboard, and several of the soldiers, including Jared, were taken by life-flight to a hospital (or roll).

The injuries sustained were to Jared's legs upon impact. The doctors had informed Jared and Tiffani that the road to recovery would take some time, but all would be addressed once he arrived home.

Less than a month after the crash, Jared resumed flights and completed his tour. He came back from that, his final deployment in November of 2019.

Three years, eleven total surgeries--on both knees, both feet, and twice on the same Achilles tendon—and mere months away from 20 years in and full retirement, he received a letter stating that he is medically unfit for duty. In the Army's opinion, he cannot physically do his job anymore. He was given 90 days' notice of

dismissal, a disappointing end for Jared and his family.

Through many and varied experiences across 20 years, his relationships with his unit became an important part of his life, and that is what he will miss the most. "I will miss the people I served with...miss the family...a very close family," some of whom have ties to Humphrey and to St. Francis. John Ternus' grandparents were from Humphrey; Lance Harvey, who was also in the helicopter crash, is the son of Robin Cheney who taught Spanish at St. Francis for a few years; and Carson Fuscher is the son of Kathy Fuscher who taught English at St. Francis, and, in fact, taught both Jared and Tiffani.

Recently Jared took his final flight in ahelicopter during his final weekend drill training as a member of the National Guard, and Tiffani got to go with him. For ten years his unit had sent letters to the president requesting permission family members to take a ride with them. The request was always denied until this year. Joe Biden said yes. So on Sunday, September 11, Tiffani donned a headset, took a seat beside her husband of twelve years-sweetheart of 22-and took a 30minute airborne stroll over the city of Grand Island and the Platte River. Tiffani very much enjoyed the flight, saying "It was awesome! We [wives] were nervous at first, especially when they handed us barf bags! But no one threw up." Jared, on the other hand, was alternately a little bored (adrenaline is in short supply on a training flight, compared to serving in the Mideast) and somewhat deiected. knowing that was the last time he would be in a helicopter as a soldier.



During his 2019 tour in Afghanistan, Jared's Company flew with a St. Francis flag during a Combat Assault mission. This flag hangs in the halls of St. Francis where two of Jared and Tiffany's kids currently attend; Alivia, fourth grade and Preston, second grade.

Now he is trying to figure out what to do with the rest of his life. He is very young—37—with a lot of years ahead of him. Tiffani described him as a "jack of many trades." It is just finding the right fit for a man who has spent the last 20 years managing supplies, keeping helicopters in good running condition, and flying secret missions in service of our country, protecting those who serve.



Jared made it clear that he wants the St. Francis community to know that he appreciates all of the tremendous support-every letter, every care package, every prayer, every token of support—meant a great deal, uplifting him during his time away from home.

Small town plus small school does not equal small future. Nick Sachau, a 2014 graduate of St. Francis, is a great example of setting the bar high.

After Nick graduated from St. Francis, he attended Wayne State College and graduated in May of 2017 with a Bachelor of Science majoring in psychology, sociology and criminal justice.

Nick saw law in his future and enrolled at Creighton University where he earned a Juris Doctor degree in May of 2022. As summer came to a close, Nick's future was just beginning to open even wider; he passed the Bar Exam, finishing in the top ten percent.

On September 20, joined by his proud family, Deacon Kent and Tina Sachau, at the State Capital in Lincoln, Nick took an oath and was sworn in by the Nebraska Supreme Court.

After celebrating his achievement, Nick took a moment to reflect on how he got to where he is today. Coming to St. Francis as a junior, he found it very

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
