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A WORD FROM THE PRESIDENT

The school year has begun, and while things are different this year, they are off to a great start. Many things have taken great shape at both St. Francis Elementary and Archangels Catholic High School. We have increased spiritual growth opportunities for our students along with an increase in service projects focusing on our community and those around us. Our fall sports teams have been competing well, and the One Act team is already preparing for their first competition.

Every day I see more and more parishioners, school families and community members embracing our parish family's new high school, Archangels. I do, however, still see some resistance to the change. lt's unfortunate that the resistance to change has also impacted our parish and school system financially. While I know, from past experiences, that people think withholding their financial gifts is a way to show displeasure toward decisions made, it in-fact is only hurting their own cause - the parish and the students in the Catholic schools.

Sacred Scriptures are a big help for me during situations like this. Mark's gospel, which we hear from this month, hones in on following Jesus. In one passage a rich man came and asked Jesus what he must do to inherit eternal life. Jesus tells him, "Go sell all that you have and

give to the poor, then come and follow me." While money, power and influence are not inherently evil things; the rich, powerful, and influential often use their status to dominate others. Jesus asks the rich man, and each of us in our own way, to divest ourselves of our idols and all the things that keep us from God. Namely, we are to let go of the things in life that we make as a god in this world or use to oppress others.

Jesus calls us to follow Him and to unburden ourselves of the obstacles in our lives that harden our hearts or contribute towards our feelings of entitlement – that we have a right to something. Thus, needing to ask, "Is God my God and my all?", or "Is something of this world holding me back?".

I ask you to spend some time in reflection and prayer that during this season of giving that you may open your heart to generously give to the mission of Catholic Education in Humphrey, which has been a part of our 'tradition' for more than 100 years.

May God Bless you abundantly in His love and Grace.

STUDENTS TRAVEL TO OPEN DOOR MISSION

LIVING THE CORPORAL WORKS OF MERCY

On Monday, September 9, the ACHS juniors and seniors traveled to North Omaha near **Eppley** Airfield. volunteer at Open Door Missions, a faithbased homeless shelter. Open Door Missions is a gospel organization that fights homelessness and poverty through various programs including Safe Shelter, Feeding the Hungry, and Homeless Prevention. Thousands of lives are saved or changed through Open Door Missions. and the students consider it a blessing that they were able to help for a day as well as to learn about the organization.

The bus left school at 7:55 am and arrived at the shelter by 10 am. Under the roar of jets coming and going





nearby as well as the sounds of the city, the students were briefed by mission workers before beginning the work of the day. Students worked together to sort through all kinds of donations made by Good 360. alobal а organization that connects donors with nonprofits to distribute donated goods to people in need. These items included clothes, toys, shoes, and household items. After two hours of sorting. students were led to the dining hall



where anyone can come in and get a free, hot meal every day. Students ate at the shelter with those who came for a meal that day. Meals are made daily by volunteers in the Open Door Mission kitchen.

After lunch everyone was given a tour of campus including all the places people stay, classrooms, and places of worship, as well as the Homeless Prevention Building where less fortunate families can come and pick up household items they may need.



To end the service retreat, everyone headed back to the donation warehouse to sort through the final bit of donations made by Good 360. With time running out, the students filed onto the school bus and arrived back at school by 4 pm, just in time to start practices for fall sports.

FAMILY LEGACY

BUILT ON A FOUNDATION OF FAITH, FAMILY AND CATHOLIC EDUCATION

I loved growing up in Humphrey. Grab me for a beer sometime, and I'll share numerous memories of growing up in Humphrey, and the countless friendships made that have stood the test of time."

Josh Boesch (2000), the oldest child of Jack (1975) and Cindy (Fisher) Boesch was recently named as one

of the top 40 executives under the age of 40 by the Midlands Business Journal; he has ownership in multiple businesses.

He loves to share some of memories with anyone who asks. "In Humphrey, everyone lives in glass houses, so we inherently had to do everything with a sense of faith, pride, and purpose, while working hard, and any lack of these would be very clear to the rest of the community." He believes that made him а better and person. adulthood he continues to live as if everyone else knows everything about him. "This has made me thrive, even in a larger community like Omaha."

He remembers his time in high school and the faculty and coaches with fondness. "The school has been riddled with high quality teachers, priests, and staff, from Mrs. Price honing my math skills, to Mr. (Dean) Korus encouraging the creative side of my brain, to Fr. Wayne Pavela teaching me about faith. Glen Koski and Mike Grape pushed us in sports and solidified that mental toughness that it's taken to be successful as a



business owner. If you gave me a roster of teachers at that time, I could go down it and tell you each of the impacts made on me!" He shares that it was the culture of both the town and the school that prepared him for challenges that came later. "I had so much pride in the community, and still do."

Josh attended Creighton University graduated with BSBA and а (Bachelor of Science in Business Administration) with a double major Accounting and Managerial in Information Systems. Starting off as a CPA, and looking to make a bigger impact, Josh moved into business of recruitment. This switched on his entrepreneurial drive, leading him to buy companies in a wide range of industries under Boesch Enterprises, a private equity group. With a goal of buying a company a year, Josh plans on rolling up a small percentage of them to offer to friends and family allowing for more funding for more companies.

She still returns each year to the St. Francis Bazaar for the turkey and sausage.



Not to be outdone by her older brother, she is nationally recognized in the field of nursing and has been awarded an endowed professorship at Creighton University. Like her older brother. she attended University Creighton after high school to study nursing. She has earned a Bachelors of Science in Nursing (BSN) from Creighton University (2005), a Masters of Science in Nursing Education (MSN) from Clarkson College (2012), and a Doctorate of Philosophy (PhD) from Villanova University (2018).

Knowing she wanted to study nursing, Mandy worked as a nursing assistant through high school and college until graduating from Creighton University. Afterwards she took a job as a staff nurse in the Burn Unit at The Nebraska Medical Center. eventually becoming clinical educator for the Critical Care Division. Part of her role is to mentor and encourage faculty toward success in their research endeavors, which effective includes studying educational methods and promoting the improvement of patient care based on reliable evidence, then sharing their success via poster or muiboa presentations and publications in peer-reviewed professional journals.

Mandy shared that she has many memories of St. Francis that she

believes helped shape her as a person. "My Catholic upbringing has certainly instilled values that I have to this day, and come through daily in my work as an educator at a Jesuit institution. I hope to instill these in my own children - do unto others as you would have them do unto you."

When she thinks back to her time in she school. believes high "experiences on the speech team, doing mock trial, one-act play, and as a cheerleader were formative in getting me comfortable speaking in front of crowds. I also believe my creative writing classes helped me fall in love with writing, thank you, Miss Tetschner and Mrs. Zach! I'm now a published author, with one book chapter and numerous nursing journal articles. I also see my new role as Associate Dean as the 'cheerleader' on the College of Nursing team. I get to help others with their writing and encourage them in their research endeavors."

She is also grateful for Fr. Wayne and Mr. Jeff Korus for getting involved in youth ministry. attended and served as a leader at multiple youth retreats. which helped me to learn more about myself and what was important to me, providing me with the tools of discernment and prayer I have used throughout my life. Mrs. Policky (McAlexander at the time) was also a great encourager and helped me to see qualities in myself I didn't know I had through my time

in her classes and in mock trial competitions."

She is married to Ryan Kirkpatrick who is originally from Blair, Nebraska. The couple lives outside of Blair with their three children. Declan (14), Mason (10), and Evelyn (7).

After moving to Humphrey, Jack and Cindv welcomed three children into their family: Kyle (2003), Mitchell (2007), and Jillian (2010). It was important to Jack and Cindy that their children had the opportunity to attend college and all graduated from Creighton University. Kyle, Mitchell, and Jill, served in the Army throughout college and some of their careers. and all serve in leadership roles within their respective occupational fields.


